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# Parkland, a year later — DeSantis has grand jury probe Broward schools — More indigenous than Warren: Rubio — Another Florida mayor eyeing 2020?

Brooks: A virtually unheard-of mayor in Florida is seriously considering running for president, and he's getting help from former staffers who helped launched former Tallahassee mayor Andrew Gillum's campaign for governor.
