

Meetings & Events Management Certificate (MEMG)

The certificate in Meetings & Events Management provides an operations-focused curriculum to those who desire employment within the meetings, events, exhibitions or conventions industries. Students must complete **15 credits** from the courses below. The certificate in Meetings & Events Management is open to **both degree-seeking and non-degree-seeking** students. All courses must be completed with a minimum grade of "C" or higher. Courses may have prerequisites, corequisites or other requirements. **Non-degree-seeking students need program director approval prior to enrollment in all courses.**

The certificate is particularly valuable for FAU degree-seeking students outside of the College of Business and to community members, hospitality industry professionals and seasonal residents.
